2:00 pm Classical Music of India and Pakistan by Ferhan Qureshi (tabla) and Srinivas Reddy (sitar)



6:15 pm Tibetan Bell Experience by Karma Moffett

Karma has sifted through thousands of Tibetan bowls over a period of fifty years to accumulate his scale. These were selected for their purity and clarity of sound, sustained resonance, and harmonic blending or pairing with the other bowls within the set. The bowls are handmade antique using the finest metals creating the purest sounds. The Tinsha Cymbals are made of Black Metal, (twelve alloys including meteorite). The varying thickness of the metals produces a variety of tones and harmonics, within each bowl. When the bowls are played in runs or struck as pairs, their harmonics penetrate the physical and subtle bodies of the listeners. Karma's mastery of circular breathing, which he applies to the Longhorn, Native American Flute, and Conch Shells, allows him to bring the pure tones of each instrument to the listener in an unbroken stream of sound. The audience easily relaxes into a natural state of meditation.

11:00 am Hindustani Classical Music by Teed Rockwell accompanied by Tim Witter

Teed Rockwell plays Hindustani classical music on a newly customized instrument he calls the touchstyle veena, which has a guitar-like fretboard played by tapping the strings simultaneously with both hands. He has had over a hundred classes in Hindustani Classical Music with Ustad Ali Akbar Khan, and also studied extensively with Ustad Shahid Parvez, Pandit Habib Khan, Debashish Bhattacharya and Ustad Salamat Ali Khan. In the late 1950s, Ravi Shankar and Ali Akbar Khan created a musical form called jugalbandi in which two melody instruments perform together in interactive conversation. On a touchstyle veena, it is possible for one musician to play jugalbandi with himself. Both hands talk to each other, improvising melodies and then repeating



them with variations in the other hand. Teed is the only person to ever perform Jugalbandi by himself on this unique instrument.

Tim Witter

Tim Witter began his tabla training with Ustad Alla Rakha in 1980. He has studied since 1984 with Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri and 'tied Ghunda" with him in 1994 becoming a devout disciple. He has also studied Mridungam and kanjira with Subash Chandran in Madras in 1996/97. He has made numerous trip to India for study and performance, and in 1994/1995 completed a research/performance grant awarded to him by the American Institute of Indian Studies. Tim taught at the Ali Akbar College of Music in San Rafael,CA for over twenty years and continues his studies with Swapanda. Currently, he hosts the musical gatherings in his home in Sebastopol with the intention of presenting the traditional music in an intimate house-concert setting.


